OUTLINE ITINERARY AND WALKING ROUTE SUMMARY

The route was planned to link together some of the main highlights of the High Pyrenees, the Marcadau valley, the crossing of Hourquette d'Ossoue beneath Vignemale, the Cirque de Gavarnie and the Ordesa Canyon. Most of the area was already well-known to several of us from previous treks and visits. Nigel and Jane joined us at the Wallon hut on the 22nd, and stayed in Gavarnie rather than doing the Ordesa Canyon section.





We then turned up Val du Pourtet, left the valley cloud behind and enjoyed a beautiful walk on a well-trodden path.

















After an overnight storm, which caused banging shutters and little sleep, it was a cloudy, cool and breezy start to the long 4,600 ft descent to Gavarnie. There were steep zig-zags at first, followed by a balcony route in sunshine before an hour's rain for the final descent to la Grange de Holle.



It was to be our biggest day's climb of the whole trek, 1230 m (4,030 ft). It began with a gentle walk into the floor of the Cirque, followed by a steep rock scramble up l'Echelle des Sarradets, which led to zig-zags up the steep mountainside to the hut, with spectacular views of the Cirque, the Grande Cascade and the frontier walls.



























This covers the whole route and within the limits of the scale it has good detail, including contouring, hill shading, huts and many of the mountain paths, and it gives a good overall impression of the area.

Carte de Randonnées	1:50,000	4	Bigorre
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The second edition (1985) of this series of maps is much improved, and sheet 4 covers our whole route apart from the Grande Fache excursion, and there is good coverage of the Spanish section, which includes the Ordesa Canyon. In general the topographical detail is good, huts and paths are clearly marked, and the HRP is more accurately represented than on the 1:25,000 maps.

Sheet 1647 OT covers our route as far as the Bayssellance hut, and sheet 1748 OT covers it from there to the Spanish frontier, without any coverage of the Spanish side. Maps in this series have clear and accurate detail.

GUIDES

Knowing the area so well from four previous visits, I didn't refer to a guide this year. These are the ones I have used previously for treks throughout the Pyrenees.

Walks and Climbs in the Pyrenees	Kev Reynolds	Cicerone	2017 (6th Edition)
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I have been using this guide since I bought the first edition (1978) for planning the first MGS camping trek I organised in 1982. My 2nd edition copy (1983) is a well illustrated, well laid out, and informative guide which covers most of the ascents and connecting paths that a walker/scrambler is likely to need.

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This has a very detailed and accurate account of the HRP and its variants.

TRAVEL AND ACCOMMODATION

Organisational details such as transport links and details of the huts are not included as they are readily available online.

I produced the first illustrated version of a 2009 log in the autumn of that year as single A4 pages in Word using full size images, and then printed and bound it. The total size for all 48 pages was 508 MB.

This version, with the addition of a digital sketch map, a detailed route summary, some extra images, and a list of 3000 m points was produced in 2017 on an Apple iMac using Word for Mac 2011, with iPhoto and Preview for editing the images. Most of the images were taken by Lesley and me, but thanks to John, Paul, Tim, Roger and Nigel for theirs that I have used. The images are low resolution versions which still display fairly well at A4 page size. The average size of the 181 images used is about 67 kB, giving a total file size of about 13 MB, about the size of 4 original images.

Thanks to Dave Shaw who identified the flowers I didn't know.

OLD TREKKERS' TREKS 3000 m POINTS

I first had the idea of producing a list of the 3000 m points that the OTT have reached in 2011 while we were on the summit of Petzek (3283 m). I couldn't remember the last two digits of Hohe Riffler's height (3231) and hence which of them was higher, making it the second highest peak we had reached by 2011. I have since produced versions for the earlier logs 2007 - 2010.

All are summits except where marked § for high points on a ridge.
